Churches Resurrect an Old Easter Custom

Many American churches are resurrecting an old Easter custom begun by the Greeks in the early centuries of Christianity — "Holy Humor Sunday" celebrations of Jesus' resurrection on the Sunday after Easter.

For centuries in Eastern Orthodox, Catholic and Protestant countries, the week following Easter Sunday, including "Bright Sunday" (the Sunday after Easter), was observed by the faithful as "days of joy and laughter" with parties and picnics to celebrate Jesus' resurrection.

Churchgoers and pastors played practical jokes on each other, drenched each other with water, told jokes, sang, and danced.

The custom was rooted in the musings of early church theologians (like Augustine, Gregory of Nyssa, and John Chrysostom) that God played a practical joke on the devil by raising Jesus from the dead. "Risus paschalis - the Easter laugh," the early theologians called it.

In 1988 the Fellowship of Merry Christians began encouraging churches and prayer groups to resurrect Bright Sunday celebrations and call it "Holy Humor Sunday," with the theme: "Jesus is the LIFE of the party."

Many churches from different traditions responded enthusiastically. Holy Humor Sunday services are bringing back large crowds to churches on a Sunday when church attendance typically drops dramatically.


Coffee Hour Hosts Needed

From the Trustees: The Budgeting Process by Phil LeHoux

We had our "first look" at the outline of a budget for the 2024-25 year, which starts July 1st. This preliminary document consists of the Treasurer taking the current year's spending pattern to the end of February and

extrapolating it, with escalations, into next year, while adding any additional expenditures either anticipated or desired by the various Boards. It may come as a surprise to many, but our costs are 86% "people" and only 14% "stuff/services." The many category lines in the budget which is mostly made up of many small

categories of stuff and services tend to obscure this fact. Revenue to cover these expenses, a combination of Unrestricted Giving and interest income, is then factored in to determine the overall financial health of the congregation.

How good are the numbers? Pretty good actually, at least on the expenditure side, since we are no longer burdened with building "surprises" (of the unwelcomed kind). Most of our other costs can be projected from inflation data and decided salary increases. New programs and equipment expenditures may not be direct burdens on the operating budget since these may qualify for distributions from the FCC Trust. The income side, at least the Giving part, is much harder to predict. This is the Stewardship aspect where the trustees are trying to improve their understanding of the short- and longer-term implications of the trends. The short-term pattern is very positive. This year, Giving has increased over \$20% through a combination of plate contributions, online donations and draws from members' IRA accounts. However, to keep this in perspective, this is less than \$10,000 more than the \$41,000 expected/budgeted through the end of February. The longer term of a decade or more continues to reflect the trend of reduced income directly associated with reduced participation, an unfortunate trend experienced by most of our sister churches.

You may have questions regarding the expenditure side of the preliminary budget that was reviewed at the last Congregational Meeting, especially now that you may have had time to digest the contents of the spreadsheet. Please feel free to engage any trustee about it at coffee hour or through a call.

April Outreach ~ Becky Bishop

The Outreach Board has chosen The Utah Food Bank program "Kids Café" to receive donations designated to Outreach for the month of April. Kids Café: Kerri Duncan is in charge of Kids Café and she was excited to hear that we were supporting her program.

"Filling the nutrition gap that exists during outof-school hours with nutritious after-school meals." They currently serve 2,000 meals a day. During the summer, when the children are not in school, they serve meals at parks and other locations.

Utah Food Bank's Kids Café is offered in partnership with educational after-school sites at local elementary schools, Boys & Girls Clubs, and community centers. Last year alone, this program provided 366,466 meals to children at risk of hunger. Kids Café meals provide the kind of nutrition that grows healthy, resilient bodies and minds. It helps fill the nutrition gap that often exists during out-of-school hours for many children who rely on free or reduced-price meal programs during the school day. The objectives of the program are twofold: first, to ensure that the children most vulnerable to hunger receive an evening meal, and second, to provide balanced nutrition in each meal served.

Last year, our Kids Café kitchen staff prepared an average of 1,409 meals each weekday. These meals were packed and transported to 121 sites where at least 50% of the children qualify for free or reduced-price school lunches. Participating sites offer not only a way to satiate hunger, but also a safe place where children can participate in educational, recreational, and social activities under the supervision of trustworthy staff.



Next Steps Committee Keeps Moving Forward

In February's *Clarion*, we introduced the Next Steps Committee which is working on the key questions from our Congregational Conversations:

- Demographics and other information about our church membership
- Issues and needs that our church members are the most concerned about
- Demographics and other information about our surrounding communities
- Wanting to understand the perspectives and needs of each of the generations in our society right now.
- Wanting to understand the perspectives and needs of "Nones", those who have "no religious affiliation"

The Committee has nearly completed a questionnaire for all the members of the congregation, as we try to understand better who we are now, what kinds of talents and passions for service we have, and how you understand our church's mission. Don't be surprised if you get something in the mail, email or a phone call about it!

What Happened at the Congregational Meeting, March 10?

The minutes are still being prepared, but below is a summary to keep everyone in the loop.

1. Moderator Track Nominations and Election.

Cissy Wolff was nominated to serve as Second Associate Moderator (she accepted). Next year's Moderator Track was then elected:

2. **Forming Nominating Committee.** Some of the seats on the Nominating Committee are filled by the Church's By- laws: Pastor and Past Moderator. Three further seats are members-at-large. Nominations were given from the floor, and the at-large members were elected.

Nominating Committee for 2024–25: Carla McIntire (Past Moderator), Rev. Doug Gray (Pastor). At-Large: Becky Bishop, Scott Brown and Glenda LeHoux

- 3. **Trust Fund Authorizations.** The Trustees recommended three expenditures from the Trust to help All Saints Episcopal Church with their parking lot (\$5,500), to help All Saints with their roof (\$25,000), and for improved worship and streaming technology (\$20,500). These expenditures were approved by the congregation.
- 4. **Presentation of the Preliminary Budget.** Treasurer Mike McIntire presented the preliminary budget for 2024–25, with commentary. Copies of the budget are available from the church office upon request. There was a great deal of discussion around the proposed budget's assumption (on recommendation from Council) that we set aside half of the proceeds of the sale of the building to make a difference in the community. No decisions were made, but there was a motion to bring this matter up for Congregational discussion and vote at the Annual Meeting on June 2.
- 5. **Report from Next Steps Committee** Rev. Gray talked about the effort by the Next Steps to answer the Congregation's questions (see "Next Steps Marching Forward" above). The plans are in development but in broad strokes, the hope is that the congregation will have a series of informational meetings in the fall, take that information, and begin in earnest the strategic planning for our church's future. The hope (and prayer!) is that we will have more clarity after that information, and can chart our course as a fellowship with faith and boldness. (The February Clarion also has an article about this committee's work.)
- 6. **Report from Outreach** Becky Bishop (Chair) talked about the different missions that Outreach has been hearing from and supporting. Outreach's role runs parallel with the Next Steps Committee, finding and "short listing" the most exciting and deserving missions, so that our congregation can think more clearly about how we want to make a difference in our community. Then in the fall, our congregation will hear directly from some of these organizations, and see how God leads us.
- 7. **Pastor's Report.** Pastor Doug reminded us that we are on a journey. Some of our fellowship are going to really want to run ahead—they are so excited about the possibilities! Some of our fellowship may not be so keen—they are excited too (or maybe not!) and need some time to wrap their minds and hearts around what God is doing! We are going to need to be patient with each other as we head out into these uncharted waters because we want to all get there, and we want to do it together.
